Safety:

- Home Escape Planning
- Toys vs. Tools

Objectives: The students will demonstrate understanding of:

- Tools vs. Toys
- Smoke Alarms
- What to do in a Fire
- Close your door
- Escape Plans

Vocabulary:

- Tools- things that help us do work.
- Unattended-unsupervised or left by itself
- Plan-an idea, text, or diagram that represents what someone hopes to do in the future
- Superhero- a person who is admired for courage, outstanding achievements, or noble qualities.

Time: 45-60 minutes for presentation and demonstration.

Instructional Content:

Use this bulleted list to guide you and keep you on track and meeting all objectives for lesson. Everyone has their own style for teaching, the most important thing is the make it fun and engaging for the kids.

Warm up Activities: (5-7 Minutes)

- Mini KWL:
 - Ask students to individually make a mini KWL chart about heroes or fire safety.
 - K-What do you already know about heroes or fire safety?
 - W-What do I want to know about heroes or fire safety?
- Bell Ringer:
 - Fire Safety Superhero Bell Ringer:
 - Have students complete the top portion of the Fire Safety Superhero Bell Ringer.
- Entrance Ticket:
 - Ask students to try to define: Tools, Unattended, Plan, and Superhero

Closure Activities: (5-7 Minutes)


- Fire Safety Superhero Bell Ringer:
 - Have students complete the exit ticket activity on the Fire Safety Superhero Bell Ringer Worksheet.
 - <u>Exit Ticket</u>: On the bell ringer activity on the first page, see if you circled and squared the correct objects. If not, correct what you wrote with a different color. Add two words to your superhero description, and add to your definition of a home escape plan!
- Exit Ticket:
 - Ask students to use what they learned to add more detail to the definitions they
 wrote at the beginning of class for the following words: Tools, Unattended, Plan,
 and Superhero
- Mini KWL:
 - Ask students to finish the last column for the KWL chart about being a superhero and/or fire safety.
 - L-What did you learn?


