Fatal fifth-wheel trailer fire claims the lives of two victims.

[Maltby, WA] – Snohomish Regional Fire & Rescue (SRFR) was dispatched at 6:31 p.m. this evening to the 9000 block of 212th Street Southeast in Woodinville following multiple reports of a fifth-wheel trailer fire with a large column of smoke visible from approximately one mile away.

When Engine 33 arrived, the trailer was fully engulfed in flames. Battalion 71, Engine 71, Engine 77, Engine 72, Engine 73, and Battalion 31 arrived shortly thereafter. Battalion 71 established quick command, and crews initiated fire attack while identifying hazards, including a nearby propane tank on the south side of the structure and overhead, arching power lines to the north.

Due to the advanced fire conditions, crews were unable to safely enter the structure upon arrival and initiated a defensive exterior attack. Firefighters successfully prevented the fire from spreading to nearby brush and trees. With no hydrant available, crews deployed hose lines from four engines to extinguish the fire.

Once the fire was knocked down and conditions were deemed safe for entry, crews located two deceased victims, one near the front of the trailer and one toward the rear.

The Snohomish County Fire Marshal's Office responded to the scene and is investigating the cause of the fire, which remains undetermined at this time. The identities of the victims have not yet been released.

SRFR reminds residents of the importance of installing and maintaining working smoke alarms in all homes, including RVs and trailers. Smoke alarms should be installed in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the residence.
